We use '**but**' to join parts of a sentence or words that differ from each other.

We use '**or**' to make a choice or compare.

Words like '**and**', '**or**' and '**but**' are used to join two sentences or words.

They are called **joining words**.

- For example**

 2. Ayush plays cricket **but** he is not a good player.
 3. You may choose indoor **or** outdoor games.
